## What is a working dog?

A working dog is defined in Section 3 of the Act as a dog used primarily for the purpose of droving, tending, working, or protecting stock, and *this also includes a dog being trained as a working dog.* 

Farm working dogs are exempt from microchipping and registration requirements; however, these dogs are valuable animals and owners are encouraged to have their dogs microchipped and registered for the dogs' own protection.

## Does my working dog have to be microchipped and registered?

When Council determines whether a dog is classified as an exempt working dog, Council may base their decision on where the animal is ordinarily kept, as well as the breed of the dog and what work it is used for.

If your working dog is ordinarily kept in the Western Division of NSW that does not fall within a local government area or on land rated as farmland, it does not have to be microchipped or registered.

If you have a working dog but live in an urban area you are still required to microchip, and lifetime register your dog. Your occupation, for example if you are a shearer or stock and station agent, doesn't mean your dog is exempt from microchipping and lifetime registration, but no registration fee can apply.

All other working dogs that live in a local government area or land rated as non-farmland, must be microchipped and registered, however, no fee is payable to register a working dog.

Working dogs that need to be registered, need a working dog statutory declaration with a Primary Producers confirmation that the dog works on their property.

All statutory declarations need to be witnessed by a Justice of the Peace before they can be received by council.

However, you should consider having your working dog microchipped and registered for its protection. You will not have to pay to register your working dog.

A working dog that has been declared as a nuisance dog, a restricted dog or a declared dangerous or menacing dog, must be microchipped, and registered with your local council.

In addition, any dog, including a working dog, that is taken into the custody of a council pound must be microchipped and registered before being returned to its owner. Where the dog is a working dog, there is no fee payable for registration.

When receiving or giving companion animal paperwork, please ensure that the animal is microchipped and has been identified prior to taking registration payment.
