## Regional Economic Development Strategies


REDS are designed to enable growth and jobs in communities across regional NSW

- In 2018, the NSW Government supported councils and communities to develop Regional Economic Development Strategies (REDS).
- Each REDS sets out a vision for the region, highlights key local endowments (strengths), key engine and emerging industries, and details key strategies and actions to help achieve the vision.
- Each Functional Economic Region (FER) has a REDS
   38 areas of one or more council areas with strong economic links.
- The REDS have also helped inform major NSW Government investment decisions e.g. Special Activation Precincts and Regional Job Precincts.





## **Functional Economic Regions**



- 38 REDS were developed in 2018 -Greater Sydney, Newcastle and Wollongong don't have REDS.
- FER boundaries are mainly based on data about where people live and work, which reflect strong economic linkages.
- The FER boundaries won't be reviewed as part of this project.
- DRNSW is working closely with the Greater Sydney Commission about links to the Premier's Six Cities vision.



## Why we will update the REDS

#### More than ever, regional communities need a strong and up-to-date economic plan

- REDS are built on a consistent, proven model to support growth and jobs, with a focus on evidence-based analysis that explores the key underlying drivers of each regional economy.
- In 2021, the Government released a refreshed 20-Year Economic Vision for Regional NSW. This accounted for unfolding events, including drought, natural disasters and the COVID 19 pandemic.
- Communities across regional NSW have continued to experience significant change and challenges over the past few years, and it is critical that each region has a strong, up to date plan to guide investment, facilitate growth and support job creation.
- Supplementary material has been developed to support the ongoing use of the REDS –
  for example the Addenda prepared assessing the impacts of bushfires in impacted FERs in 2020.
- The REDS update will provide updated analysis for every FER and highlight updated priorities.
  - The updates are expected to be released in the second half of 2022. Councils and key regional stakeholders will have a critical role in informing the updates.



# Scope of the 2022 REDS update

Issue	2022 Update	
Purpose	Confirm strategic direction and priorities given unfolding events and trends.	
Focus	Highlight significant investments, achievements, opportunities and challenges.	
Evidence	<ul> <li>Draw on available public and private data points e.g. DPE population projections.</li> <li>Collecting local data (both qualitative and quantitative) from councils, businesses and organisations</li> </ul>	
Geography	Use the existing FER map, conscious of other initiatives e.g. 6 Cities Strategy	
Strategic value	<ul> <li>Reflect current contexts and priorities.</li> <li>Improve alignment with local and State plans and strategies.</li> <li>Fill critical gaps, such as recognising the importance of Aboriginal economic inclusion and prosperity.</li> </ul>

#### **Purpose**

- Understand key changes to the local economy since 2018, including new investment and impacts of recent shocks to the economy (droughts, floods, bushfires, and COVID-19)
- Understand achievements against 2018 REDS priorities, strategies and actions
- Confirm and review the status of engine and emerging industries in 2018 REDS
- Deep dive into industry specialisations (strengths, vulnerabilities and opportunities)
- Identify strategic opportunities and challenges
- Identify local actions needed to address the challenges and enable the opportunities
- Recommendations for REDS review

#### **Webinars**

DRNSW will hold State wide webinars to brief councils and joint organisations about planned work to update the REDS in 2022 and answer initial questions. 2 Subm

#### Submissions

Each council and joint organisation will be invited to make a written submission through an online portal.



DRNSW will issue a survey to businesses across regional NSW to gather their views and input about economic development in the regions. 4 Workshops

A workshop will be held for each FER to capture detail of key achievements since 2018, identify challenges and opportunities, and discuss updates to priorities, strategies and actions for that region. 5 Present Drafts

Workshop participants will be invited to a presentation of their draft REDS Update and to provide any final comments.

NSW Government will then approve the final REDS updates and their public release.



We recognise the significant challenges being faced by those LGAs severely impacted by the recent major floods – we will work closely with stakeholders in the most impacted regions (in particular the Northern Rivers) to develop a tailored timeline to deliver their REDS Update.

## **Aboriginal Community Engagement**

We will engage with Aboriginal communities and businesses as a first step towards more inclusive REDS

#### **Key objectives**

- Build understanding of the role REDS can play in supporting Aboriginal economic prosperity.
- Engage meaningfully with Aboriginal communities and businesses about priorities, opportunities and challenge
- ✓ Build connections, networks and knowledge to support comprehensive engagement with Aboriginal communities in future REDS projects.

#### **Key deliverables**

At a minimum, the aim is for each REDS Update document to include:

- ✓ An Acknowledgement of Country
- ✓ A snapshot of key metrics of Aboriginal economic development outcomes
- ✓ Key information about aboriginal economic development priorities and opportunities relevant to each region.

### Our approach

- Engage with peak representative bodies to gather input on key strategic priorities and guidance on appropriate consultation.
- Leverage existing Aboriginal partnership networks and seek to build further stakeholder connections to consult directly with Aboriginal people, communities and business across the State.
- Work with key Aboriginal business organisations and networks to achieve wide engagement via the business survey.
- Invite representatives of Aboriginal communities to participate in each regional workshop.
- Work with local government to understand how councils are supporting Aboriginal economic development.



# **Next steps**

## Next steps – local government engagement

### Written Submissions 14 April – 10 June 2022

- Online written submission portal will open this Thursday (14/4) - link and guidance will be provided via email.
- Submissions should explore:
  - ✓ How priorities, endowments and specialisations have changed in your region since 2018
  - √ key council initiatives, investment
    and planning activities since 2018
  - ✓ local initiatives focused on supporting Aboriginal community economic development.

**Final Submission due 10 June** 

Councils and joint organisations are encouraged to share a draft of their submissions prior to their FER workshop.

# Regional Business Survey May 2022 (dates TBC)

- A short business survey
   (15 minute) will be sent to regional businesses to allow them to provide their views and input.
- Focus on exploring key trends, business sentiment and key issues impacting the business climate in regional NSW.
- Feedback will be sought on priorities for investment and key enablers of growth and jobs.

Councils will be welcome to share the business survey invitation with local business and industry networks.

# Regional FER Workshops May-June 2022

- A workshop will be run in each FER bringing together representatives of key local government organisations and Aboriginal communities.
- Key priorities, issues, challenges and opportunities for the region will be discussed in detail.
- The focus of the discussion will also be shaped by any draft written submissions received.

The DRNSW Project Team will send invitations for the FER Workshops in the next two weeks.
